## Hisaaki Yamanouchi Professor Emeritus of English, Tokyo University

Along with Oxford, Cambridge is constantly ranked high in the global league table of academic excellence. There Nobel laureates are legion, and by far the most advanced original researches are being conducted at Cavendish and other laboratories. The dual system of the University and some thirty Colleges, ancient and modern, is unique in the world. Lectures of the highest level in a wide range of subjects are delivered in various Faculties, but, more importantly, Colleges make up intellectual communities where the young and old live and learn together. There students have their minds trained by discussing their weekly essays with their austere yet humane supervisors. Merit rather than privilege rules, and by the end of the 1980's all the former men's colleges had gone mixed. The speaker will give some thoughts on higher education today by telling a story of Cambridge.
