Profile: Yuko Aotani

Yuko Aotani was originally from Yokohama, Japan and then moved to London, UK at the age of 9. She lived there for 5 years before she returned to Yokohama. After graduating Sophia University (Tokyo), she joined NHK as a "Bilingual Reporter" (Japanese/English). She covered international current affairs for the domestic channel of NHK. After this assignment Ms. Aotani moved on to be Anchor of most of NHK's English news programs. She covered the Great Eastern Japan Earthquake in 2011 and presented "Election Night" specials. She occasionally hosts radio shows introducing Japanese literature. She is now a freelancer and her work ranges from news, culture, and education to various voice works. She joined the Board of Directors of ESUJ last June.
