ケンブリッジ大学卒。英国 Lady Eden's School (Kensington, London) 校長。1996年 Shell に勤務するご主人の転勤に伴い来日、東京の British School と Tokyo International Learning Community 理事、CWAJ、エリザベス会、日英協会会員として活躍。ESUJ 設立準備委員。第1回 ESUJ 大学対抗英語ディベート大会(1998年)MC。ESUJ 名誉会員。2015年から2017年まで日英「お友達会」会長。現在は Japan Society の会員。

ルース マーティン氏：

英国 Leeds 大学で中国語とフランス語を専攻。Essex 大学で「現代日本」について研究し修士号を取得。その後 *JET Programme* で2回来日。帰国後三和銀行ロンドン支店に勤務。Oxford Brookes University にて「日本における社会人類学」の研究で博士号を取得。現在は日英お友達会会長。

エリザベス セッチム氏：

Oxford 大学卒。聴覚障害児の教授法を専攻。6年間の教員経験を経て大学講師となり、その後聴覚障害者に対する教員研修責任者を務める。10年間以上 Oxford Brookes 大学と Birmingham 大学にて聴覚障害者の教育開発、実習、教員研修に従事。オランダ、インド、ベトナム、ルーマニアにおいて聴覚障害者教育開発協力を行う。1994年から4年間日本に在住。在日中はエリザベス会と日英「お友達会」で活躍。現在は「お友達会」の会報誌編集長を務める。

“Social diversity and change in the UK. The new era under King Charles III”

Panel Talk **Gillian Wayne, Ruth Martin, Elizabeth Setchim**

Gillian Wayne, lecturer of the ESUJ Zoom Talk on the late Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee, will be joined by current Nichiei Otomodachi Kai Chairman, Ruth Martin, and Kai Newsletter Editor, Elizabeth Setchim, to give us a panel discussion on various social changes in the UK including its transformation into a highly diverse society.

Some topics discussed will be the impact of Brexit upon UK's politics, economy, people, travel and other sectors. To what extent has Britain achieved gender equality? How has the UK become a multi-ethnic country whilst still retaining its historic traditions? Gillian, Ruth and Elizabeth will also share their first hand views about the new era under King Charles III.

We look forward to having an active discussion with the audience on the above topics and also share views on how Japan and Britain have reacted to and changed upon the Accession of the new Emperor and King.

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Panelist's profile

Gillian Wayne:

After graduating from Cambridge and a year in Florence, Gillian taught History at Francis Holland School in London followed by eight years as Headmistress of Lady Eden's School in Kensington. In 1996 her husband was posted by Shell to Tokyo, where she became a Trustee of the British School and of Tokyo International Learning Community and joined CWAJ, the Elizabeth Kai and the Japan-British Society. She worked with the Steering Committee to establish ESUJ, acted as MC at the inaugural ESUJ University Debating Competition in 1998 and was invited to be the first Honorary Member of ESUJ. Back in London, she taught History at St Paul's Girls' School and the City of London School for Girls and spent three years in the Netherlands on another Shell posting. She is a member of the Japan Society and a former Chairman of Nichi-Ei Otomodachi Kai.

Ruth Martin:

After studying Chinese and French at the Universities of Leeds, St Etienne and Fudan, Shanghai, Ruth studied for an MA in Contemporary Japan at Essex before spending two years on the JET Programme, first in the Board of Education and then in the International Affairs Division of Nara Prefectural Office (Kencho). She then worked in the Planning Dept. of Sanwa Bank's London Branch. When her daughters were small she undertook a PhD in the Social Anthropology of Japan supervised by Prof. Joy Hendry at Oxford Brookes University focusing on expatriate Japanese wives living in the UK. For 5 years she has been Treasurer of the international academic research organisation, Japan Anthropology Workshop (JAWS). Through her research twenty years ago Ruth encountered Nichi-Ei Otomodachi Kai and is just completing her second term of office as Chair. She is currently an Associate Lecturer at Oxford Brookes, where she is also a Research Associate of the Europe Japan Research Centre and has long been on the interview panel for the JET programme at the Embassy of Japan in London.

Elizabeth Setchim:

After graduating from Oxford and training as a teacher of deaf children, Liz was a classroom practitioner for six years before becoming a university lecturer, with responsibility for training teachers of the deaf. She spent more than ten years developing, delivering and leading teacher development programmes at Oxford Brookes University and the University of Birmingham. During this period, Liz had the opportunity to develop working relationships with colleagues in the Netherlands and later to support the development of services for deaf children in Southern India, Vietnam and Romania. From 1994 onwards, she lived in Tokyo for four years and was a Trustee of the British School. On return to the UK, she led work for children at the Royal National Institute for the Deaf (RNID) and was then seconded to work for the Department of Children, Schools and Families (DCSF) as Director of their Early Support Programme – a national programme designed to improve the co-ordination of public services provided to support families with young disabled children. A keen member of the Elizabeth Kai while in Tokyo, Liz is the current Editor of the Nichi-Ei Otomodachi Kai Newsletter.
